

FINDING ARTICLES IN DATABASES

To look for articles in journals, magazines or newspapers, start out using the Article Databases. Because NMSU has over 100 different databases, many with full-text, here are some tips to find articles. Start with the "Find Articles" link on the library homepage (lib.nmsu.edu) and choose one of the databases listed; scroll down to see all available databases.

In searching article databases, you will generally be given three different types of results.

Type 1: Citation only in the database; not full-text. Check the Library's electronic and print holdings to see if the Library owns a copy. The article may also be available full-text in another database, and the database you used may or may not have links to the other database. Look for the "Search for Full-Text" or [ARTICLE LINKER](#) link to find the article in other databases and/or to search in the library catalog. Also, check the Electronic Journals link. (See "Electronic Journals" below.)

If the Library does not own the journal, magazine or newspaper, request a copy of the article using the Interlibrary Loan service. (See "Interlibrary Loan" below.)

Type 2: Abstract only in the database; not full-text. Follow the same steps as citations.

NOTE: Always search for these by the journal title, not the article title.

Type 3: Article available full-text in the database. Click on the "Full-text" or "PDF page" link to view the article. You may print, download or email the article to yourself, depending on the features of the database you are using.

Electronic Journals

To see if the Library provides access to an electronic journal, go to the "Find Articles" link mentioned above, scroll down to the middle of the page (below where the databases are listed) then search by journal title, **not** article title. Browse by title by clicking on the first letter of the journal title.
