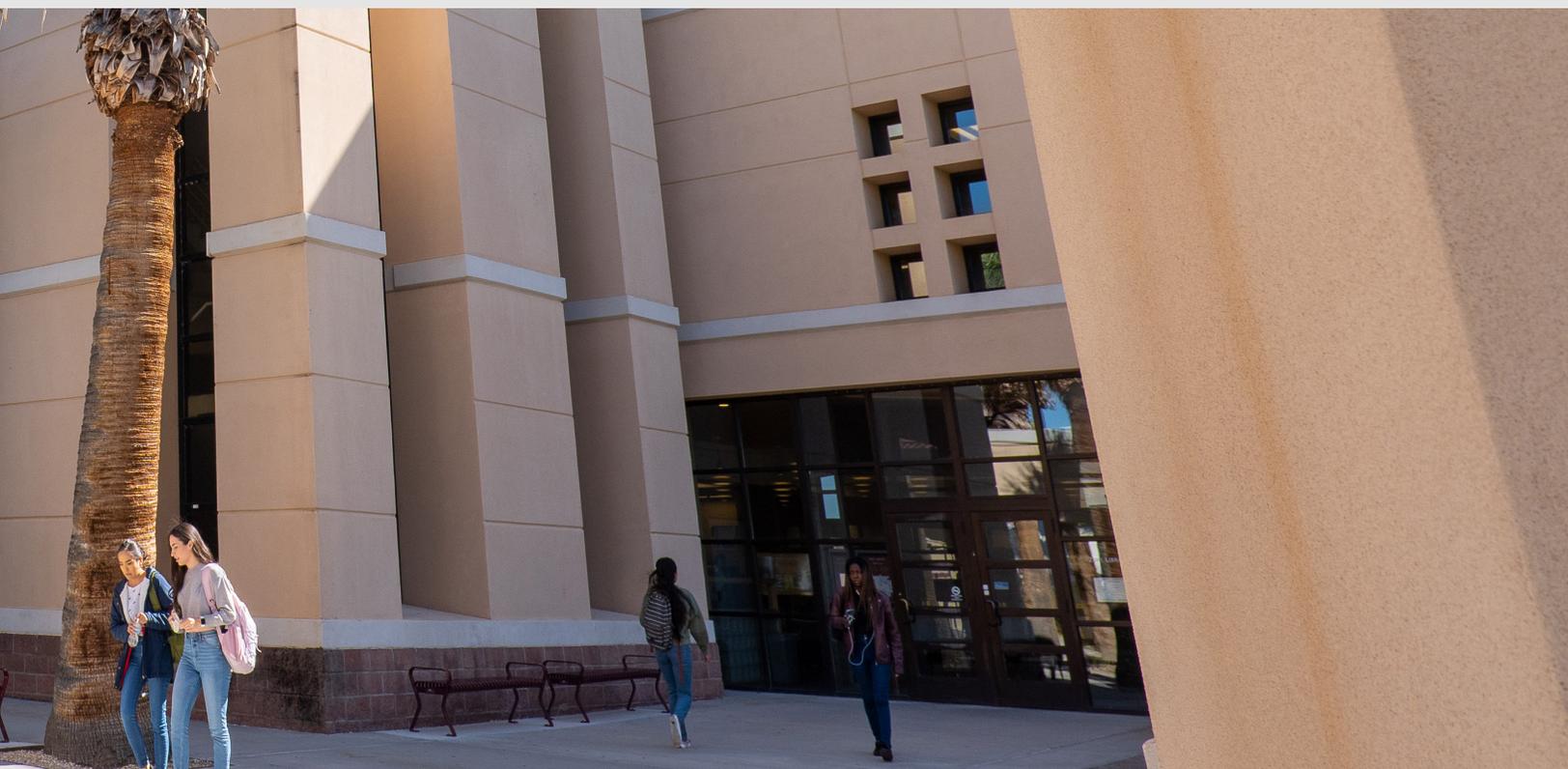

Department Overview:

NMSU Library Access Services is the heart of customer service in the library. We serve as the central hub of information on all library services, reserve materials and spaces, and loanable books and technology for NMSU students, faculty, and staff as well as those in our community. We pride ourselves on being a welcoming and reliable resource for anyone seeking assistance. Our team has also adapted and expanded our focus beyond the traditional role of a circulation department by embracing emerging technologies and the changing needs of the user, emphasizing the value of collaborative and communal third spaces and the learning environment we foster for all those who enter our doors.

In the 2024 – 2025 fiscal year, Access Services experienced a number of challenges, from staffing issues to leadership changes, dealing with an overwhelming demand for study rooms to navigating and serving as the front line against parties that would seek to disrupt our diverse and inclusive community. Each hurdle impacted what we do and how we operate. While these proved formidable, they were by no means insurmountable obstacles. Access Services remained resilient and responsive, ensuring our library continued to remain a safe and supportive place for all members of our community, regardless of the challenges we faced.

Accomplishments:

Over the past year, we achieved several milestones that reflect our commitment to service and innovation. One notable accomplishment was our success in reducing the number of lost and missing items in our collection. Through improved tracking systems, proactive communication with patrons, thorough searches, and the withdrawal of long-lost materials, we were able to streamline our inventory and enhance access to available resources.

After examining our previous process, we researched, planned, and implemented a new structured shelf maintenance process. With the help of both students and staff in Access Services, this new process ensures a more thorough inspection of our stacks and has already seen the return of a number of books previously considered missing.

Access Services also partnered with RRS to complete a large deselection project of over seventy-five hundred volumes. This combined effort effectively reduced the floor load on the second floor and paved the way for a reutilization of much needed space.

On a smaller scale, we successfully updated frequently used tools and resources. For example, eight new book carts were acquired, giving a cleaner, more cohesive look to recirculation. A large variety of forms were updated and digitized to reduce our paper usage. We have also taken strides to standardize interviewing, hiring, on-boarding, and training throughout the department to bring us more in line with the practices of the university as a whole. This also provides currently employed students with opportunities to learn all aspects of the Access Services department, not just customer service, and gives new opportunities for those looking to join our team.

LOOKING FOWARD

The future of the Access Services department is bright, and there are countless things we look forward to in the upcoming 2025 – 2026 Fiscal Year. The end of the 2024 – 2025 Fiscal Year saw the establishment of the Access Services Department Head Search Committee. We are excited and anxious to find a department head, not only to provide leadership and a clear vision for our future, but to advocate for our department.

We look to continue the progress we made in inventory management by further streamlining our newly established processes. This means analyzing our initial successes and adapting them for longevity. This also includes exploring the idea of implementing a loan forgiveness program to encourage the return of long-overdue materials and improve overall collection accuracy.

Access Services also hopes to spearhead a reimagining of the libraries' public spaces to help boost traffic, esp. at Branson, which includes revitalizing Branson's patron base with innovative ways to reengage the community. We hope some of these ideas begin to take shape and come to fruition in the fall semester of the 2025 – 2026 school term.

Finally, our department looks forward to playing an integral role in the implementation and launch of the new loanable technology program. The loanable technology program looks to provide students with the opportunity to utilize hardware and peripherals while also mitigating their personal costs.



Faculty and Staff News:

Access Services welcomed two new full time staff members during the 2024 – 2025 year. Rick Rivera joined the team in November of 2024 as the Access Services Manager of Operations. He holds an MFA in Creative Writing and has over ten years of experience in retail and hospitality supervision. During his short time in Access Services, Rick also published his second novel, in as many years, entitled SPACE BROOMS!. Ashley Lowe joined the team in December of 2024 as our new Library Assistant, Billing. She came to us from Florida State College in Jacksonville, Florida where she served as an Administrative Support Specialist with experience in Library and Learning Commons budgets and purchasing. Ashley is an NMSU Aggie graduate with a Finance degree earned in 2017.

During the 2024 – 2025 year, we also said goodbye to a number of students and staff. Jorge Ramirez, Kevin “Vinny” Robles-Realivasquez, Olivia Lopez, Rodrigo Gallegos, Sebastian Rubio-Olivas, and Xander Werito all graduated in 2025. They were valued members of the Access Services team and their contributions will be sorely missed! Lastly, an extra special thank you and farewell goes out to Laura Martinez, who not only graduated with her Master’s degree, but also served as a temp staff member during a time when we were short-handed. She was an invaluable asset to our team and we wish her well on her next chapter! We in Access Services are so proud of our graduates and former coworkers. Congratulations!

Department Overview

The NMSU Library Archives and Special Collections is a research collection serving NMSU students and faculty, scholars from other institutions, independent researchers, and the general public. The department collections, preserves, and provides access to primary and secondary documentary materials that illuminate the history and cultural heritage of New Mexico, the U.S./Mexico borderlands, and the Southwest United States. The department houses three units:

- ***Rio Grande Historical Collections:*** Contains unique historical and archival materials including manuscripts, family papers, records of businesses, non-profit organizations and government bodies, photographs, audiovisual materials, maps, and microfilm.
- ***Hobson-Huntsinger University Archives:*** Contains the permanent historical records of New Mexico State University, including papers of the presidents, records of administrative offices, councils, and support offices, records of the academic colleges and departments, faculty papers, publications, photographs, and audiovisual materials.
- ***Special Collections:*** Contains published material pertaining to the Southwest United States, including rare and out-of-print books, journals, reports, ephemera, gray literature, newspapers, maps, and audiovisual materials

A major component of the work of Archives and Special Collections is providing reference and research services to users of the collections. All members of the department, in addition to their other duties, handle reference desk shifts, and respond to virtual and telephone reference requests. Providing excellent customer service to all users is a priority of the department. Our materials are used in national and region publications such as books, journal articles, research reports, documentaries, theses and dissertations, as well as in class projects, exhibitions, and for personal enjoyment.

Accomplishments

During the past year, the Archives and Special Collections department continued to grow its collections, increased accessibility to materials, served researchers on-site and virtually, tackled space challenges, and conducted outreach in various venues. Some highlights included:

- ***Acquisitions:***
fiscal year 2024-2025
 - RGHC
 - 104 new accessions
 - Approximately 350 linear feet
 - Extensive photograph and audiovisual materials acquired
 - University Archives
 - 12 new collections
 - Around 500 linear feet
 - Physical Science Laboratory alone contains 468 linear feet plus hundreds of rolled maps and flat files
 - Special Collections
 - 2,405 titles added
 - 115 titles withdrawn

- **Donor relations**
 - In addition to in-kind collection donations, relationships with donors brought in financial gifts during 2024-2025 totaling \$9,880. These gifts come from individuals and organizations who wish to assist Archives and Special Collections with furthering its goals. Funds assist us with collection acquisition, processing, supplies, programming, and hiring of student employees.
- **Increasing accessibility**
 - Archivists and staff, with significant contributions by student employees and interns, worked on processing 15 manuscript collections, totaling about 160 linear feet, in order to make them accessible to researchers. This includes arranging the collections, describing them with a finding aid, and publishing the finding aid online.
- **Preservation:** An integral part of archival work is preservation of resources – paper documents, publications, photographs, audiovisual materials, electronic resources, etc. Some preservation projects during the past fiscal year have included:
 - Re-housing more than 2,000 photographic prints and negatives into archival enclosures
 - Flattening and encapsulation of ca. 100 historic maps
 - Conservation and re-housing of an original 1853 Mexican printing of the Gadsden Purchase
- **Collection use:** Researchers from across the United States, as well as from Spain, England, and Mexico, used our materials either on-site or virtually during the previous fiscal year. These include a large number of NMSU students, doctoral and masters' students from other institutions, scholars affiliated with other universities, independent researchers, and the general public.
 - Research room stats
 - 687 visitors
 - 1,194.5 contact hours
 - Virtual reference
 - We registered 396 reference transactions in Springshare Ref Analytics for virtual and in-person reference requests, however adoption of this system for email and phone reference requests is still not catching everything that comes in.
 - Digitization requests: A significant amount of the work we do involves digitization requests for remote users. This workload has grown during the past several years and, especially since the pandemic, is now an expectation of archives users across the world.
 - Durango microfilm – One of most popular collections is the Durango microfilm Collection. We fulfill requests for scans from these microfilms for historical and genealogical researchers.
 - 16 requests for scans
 - Approximately 2,045 pages scanned

- **Photograph requests:** Requests for photograph scans for print and electronic publication, exhibitions, research and personal use
 - 275 images scanned for user requests
 - Income from duplication requests - \$1,693.03
- **Space management:** With ever-growing collections, managing our space is always a top priority. Several optimizations happened during FY2024-2025, including:
 - Deselected approximately 44,000 items from Branson First Floor East journal storage and sent them to NMSU Surplus. We had incredible assistance in this task from Mailroom supervisor Patricia Duran, her student assistant Quetzal Reyes, and other students from Access Services
 - Acquired and arranged new flat file cases in Branson First Floor East allowing us to shift some large map collections from fourth floor to first floor, opening up space to reduce bulk in the over-stuffed drawers
 - Moved Las Cruces Sun News newspapers from second floor to first floor, allowing extensive shifting of Special Collections materials in order to make space for future acquisitions.
 - Deselected materials from third floor to make room for incoming materials for Rio Grande Historical Collections
 - Created shelf list of University Archives materials in anticipation of major restructuring of the collections



- Outreach – The department participated in several outreach events during the 2023-2024 year, including:
 - “The Ballard Photo Studio: A Portrait of Community” exhibit, October 2024-February 2025 at the Branigan Cultural Center, curated by Elizabeth Villa and Dennis Daily. The exhibit made a big impact in the community and received good regional publicity. Department Head Dennis Daily gave a couple talks at the BCC about photography and the Ballard collection during the exhibit. The BCC reported 4,744 visitors during the run of the exhibit.
 - 2024 Border Archives Bazaar, held Oct. 19, 2024, at NM Farm and Ranch Museum – 120 visitors
 - Table event at J. Paul Taylor celebration, organized by New Mexico Historic Sites, on the Mesilla Plaza, August 24, 2025, with display of materials from the J. Paul and Mary Daniels Taylor collections
 - Presentations to local organizations, including P.E.O. Sisterhood, the Daughters of the Republic of Texas, and to Taylor-Mesilla Historic Site
 - Radio and podcast appearances promoting the library and the department. Significantly Teddie Moreno had several appearances on the Dona Ana County Clerk and Records podcast “Preserving History and Democracy”
 - NMSU Black Programs Juneteenth celebration event and exhibit
 - New exhibits installed in McFee Gallery

- **Space optimization:** Actively review and deselect out-of-scope materials, rearrange and consolidate collections to make the best use of our space and ensure capacity for growth for the future
- **Acquisitions:** Collect important documentary materials related to southern New Mexico and the border region in order to provide comprehensive research collections to library users
- **Outreach:** Work with community partners to provide programming and outreach related to our collections and our region's history and cultural heritage. Create exhibitions and sponsor public lectures that highlight our work
- **Instruction:** Provide instruction sessions for NMSU classes across academic disciplines

Department Overview

An essential partner in supporting learning and research across campus, the Reference and Research Services department helps NMSU students achieve academic success. From helping library users identify their information needs, learn to use resources like the library catalog and article databases to find the information, and analyze their findings to choose the most appropriate resources, members of RRS engage in activities that promote Information Literacy and critical thinking through reference services, library instruction, and outreach activities. The major provided by RRS include:

- **Reference Services:**
 - The reference desk provides assistance identifying research needs, finding appropriate resources, searching within, and accessing specific library resources, and evaluating information as necessary. Reference assistance is offered in person and online, allowing students, faculty, and community members to get help in their choice of modality. Additionally, RRS recently joined Springshare's Global Chat Service, expanding NMSU's access to on-demand reference help through a chat cooperative around the world and contributing to this valuable resource.
- **Research Support:**
 - RRS subject liaison librarians offer in-depth consultations to NMSU students, faculty, and independent researchers, helping them identify useful research strategies, narrow down potential topics, navigate databases and other resources to find the best materials, and ensure that their individual research needs are met. Members of RRS are trained in assisting with systematic reviews, scoping reviews, and other subject-specific research projects, ensuring that researchers get the support they need to achieve their goals.
- **Instruction:**
 - The formal education program within RRS teaches students to use library resources effectively and to think critically about information. The program is based on Information Literacy concepts, and includes modules on searching databases, evaluating sources, and citing materials properly. The information covered in the library's courses, LIBR 1110 and LIBR 311V, helps students, regardless of major, become better, more agile researchers, and equips them to engage with information intelligently.
- **Resource Management:**
 - Collaborating with librarians and staff across departments, members of RRS review current library holdings and curate reference and general collections that support NMSU's existing and emerging programs.

Overall, RRS is dedicated to connecting users with the information they need and helping them to become skilled, independent information users.

Accomplishments:

- **Reference:**
 - The RRS team began offering a 24/7 Virtual Reference Service July 1, 2024. With the new 24/7 Chat Service, NMSU joined a cooperative of libraries from around the world to help answer questions around the clock. RRS also participates in the service, providing assistance to users outside of NMSU!
- **Instruction:**
 - Following last year's success, this year Reference and Research Services librarians continued to teach Information Literacy (LIBR 311V) and Introduction to Research (LIBR 1110). Additionally, after mapping the two courses' curricula to the ACRL Framework for Information Literacy for Higher Education, the instruction program provided one-shot instruction sessions across disciplines, delivering instructional services tailored to specific course needs. As NMSU developed new degree programs, the library instruction program worked to meet emerging needs proactively, identifying areas for new special topics courses and considering how the current liaison structure could be altered to support requests for instruction from these new subject areas. As always, the NMSU Library instruction program contributes significantly to academic achievement, enhances research quality, strengthens scholarly writing, and promotes ethical information use by developing information literacy competencies.
- **Collection Management:**

Over the past year several important projects have begun that will improve the library's collections.

 - As noted in last year's report, the library not only restarted the in-kind gifts program, but expanded it, allowing for access to a variety of books that complement NMSU's unique collections.
 - The RRS department continued to participate in a comprehensive collection analysis to identify items for withdrawal. These items, many damaged and outdated, have been removed from the collection, allowing for more effective use of space, and newer versions of some items, when available, have been purchased so that library users have access to the best information possible.
 - The process of maintaining library collections is ongoing, and team members in RRS are constantly reviewing holdings to evaluate their place in the library. This process is also essential to supporting the creating of new programs across the university, as degree programs proposed by the university require reports on how library resources can support students in these new areas, and members of RRS not only perform the work vital to ensuring the materials are available, but that there is room in the collection to house new resources that must be purchased.

- **Outreach:**
 - Over the past year, RRS team members participated in outreach activities designed to encourage students and faculty to use library resources and to engage with library services. While some programs were social, some focused on reaching out to specific user groups in ways that helped to minimize existing barriers to learning. The librarian responsible for this programming is new to the department and will continue to develop this systematic approach moving into the new academic year and beyond.

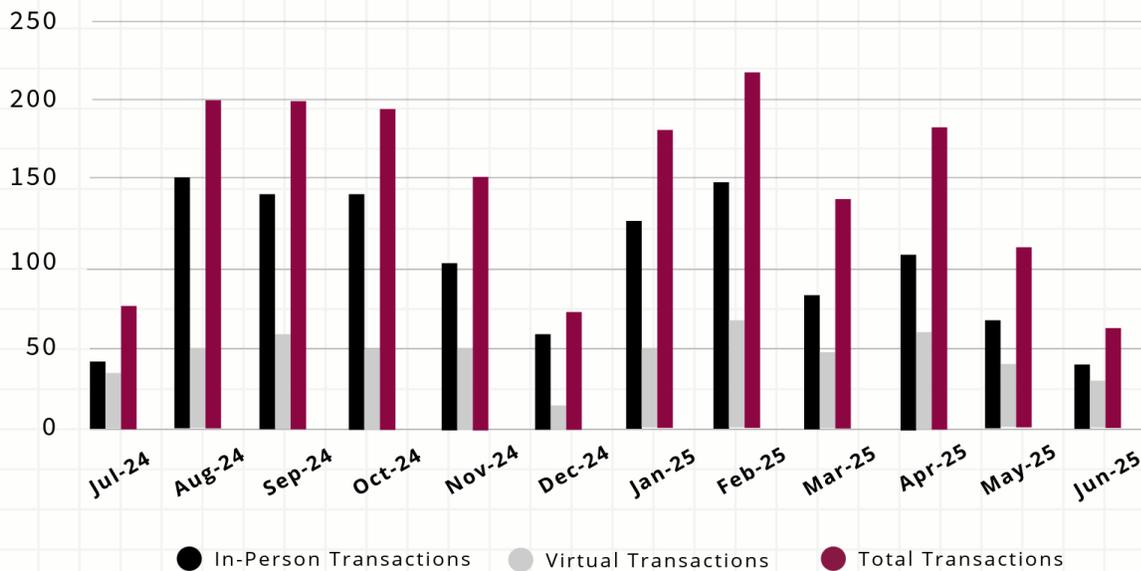
- **NMSU Global:**
 - The library, in conjunction with NMSU Global, created a new position to support the needs of faculty, course designers, and students within NMSU Global programs. The librarian in this position participated in Global's Spring and Summer 2025 Course Design Institute, created a LibGuide to address the specific needs of Global faculty and course designers, and made inroads with the Global population, answering over a dozen questions regarding course development and materials via consultation and email modalities.
- **Emerging Technology Lab (ETL):**
 - ETL use grew extensively in the past year, welcoming over 2,000 students. Users from all over campus used the 3D printer to create nearly 500 items over the year, totaling over 1,000 hours of print time and requiring nearly 28 kg of filament. The ETL's 3D printing service was used for a University Museum exhibit in spring 2025 to make tactile versions of artifacts that encouraged visitors to interact with the items, one of several key partnerships established this year. The ETL also expanded hours by nearly 50%, creating increased opportunities for students to engage with emerging technologies regardless of their majors.

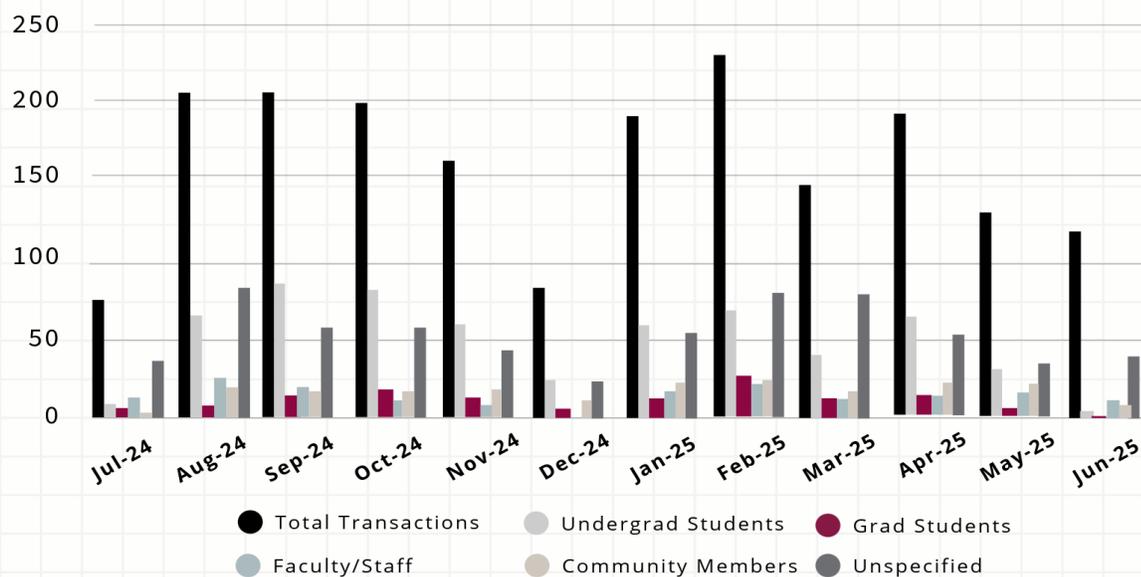

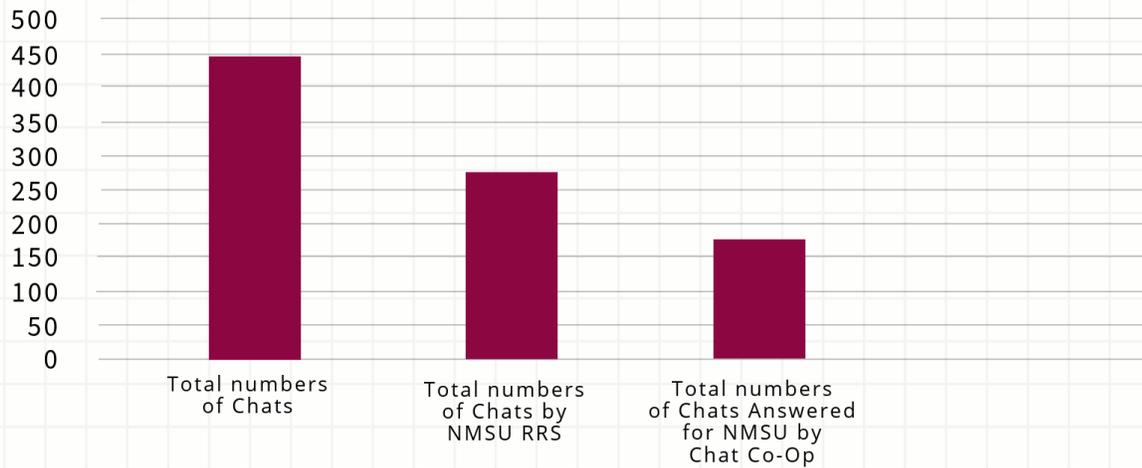
Reference Transactions by Modality, AY 2024-2025



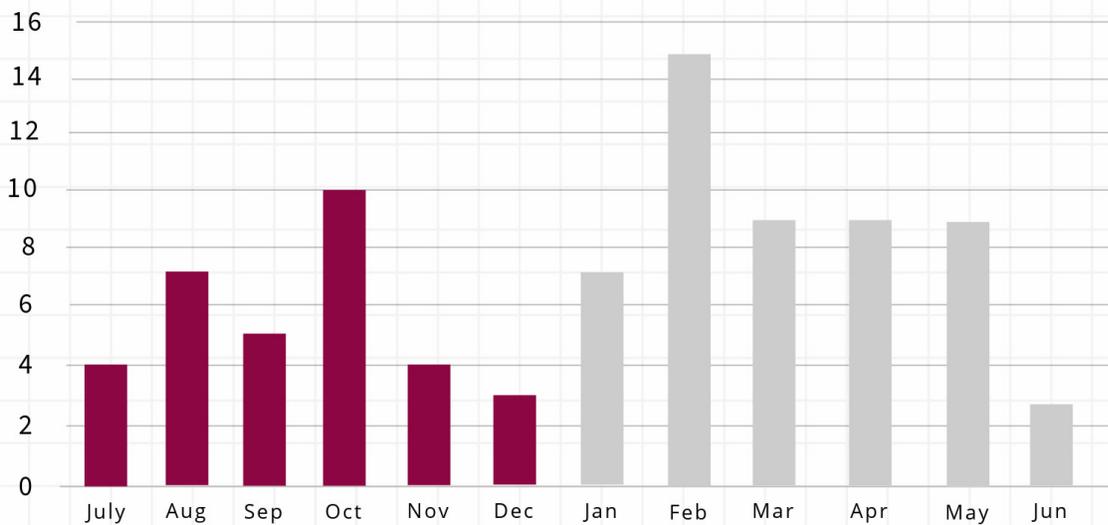
Reference Transactions by Library User Type, AY 2024-2025



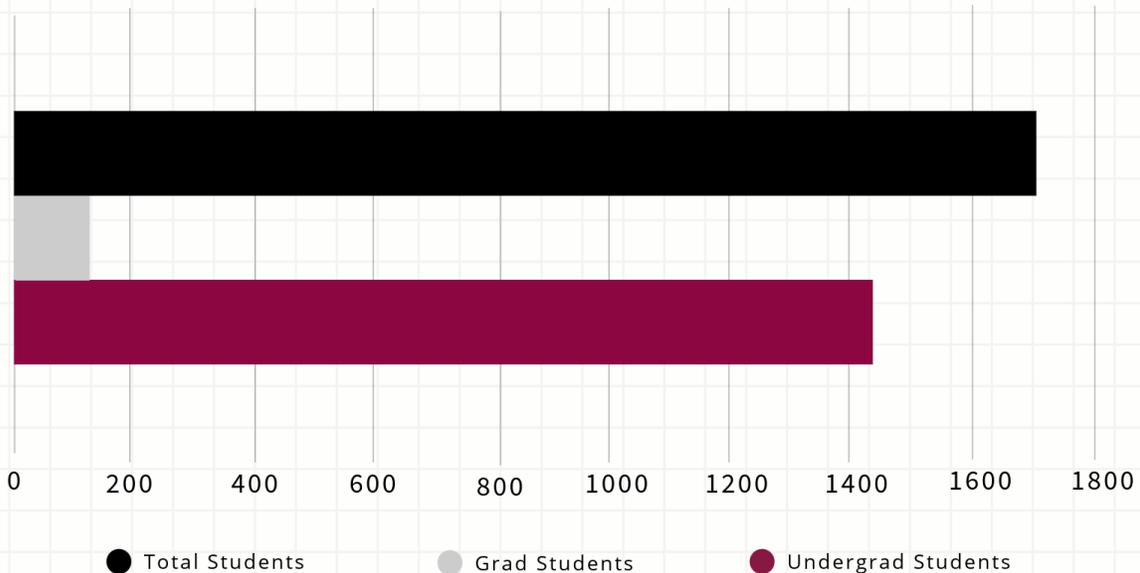
RRS Global Chat Co-Op Participation, AY 2024-2025 (Year 1)

LOOKING FORWARD

Planning for 2025-2026 is well underway! Many changes to RRS staffing and the addition of new positions to the team provide opportunities for the department to rethink current services, adjust strategic planning initiatives, and identify new areas for collaboration with partners outside of the library. The primary goals remain facilitating student learning, supporting researchers, and promoting Information Literacy across the university.

In support of these goals, RRS is working on several exciting projects, including:

- ***Creating content and appearance guidelines for NMSU LibGuides.***
This project will ensure LibGuides meet accessibility requirements and make finding information within the guides more intuitive by standardizing how information is presented. Changes to LibGuides' appearance will also make the guides more appealing to library users and help them conform to content expectations.

- ***Developing liaison guidelines.***
The process of codifying expectations for liaisons' roles as the person responsible for communicating directly with academic departments, providing one-shot instruction for assigned areas, and guiding collection management within specific areas will help in two important ways. First, it will ensure that librarians with liaison duties get credit for their work using a method that can be evaluated as part of their annual review, and second, it will offer documentation for new library faculty members who may not understand the expectations of this role within the department. This project will include feedback from faculty librarians in RRS and considerations of best practices in the field so that it reflects the department's strategic plan and service-oriented approach.
- ***Reviewing/revising assessment forms.***
To ensure that the data RRS collects provides the information needed to make decisions that affect services provided to students, faculty, and community users, reviewing data collection processes and forms periodically is important. Reviewing the forms to determine whether they collect the information the department needs also helps to identify gaps in the collection process, which can then be addressed. Thus, the goal of this project is to make sure existing procedures continue to work, and to make changes when necessary.
- ***Developing additional statistics collection processes for the ETL.***
As one of the newest services offered by RRS, the Emerging Technology Lab provides access to a wide variety of technology resources to all members of the NMSU community. Since its inception, the lab has focused on increasing access to emerging technologies and expanding offerings, and to continue this, it is imperative that the lab receive increased funding. One way to show the impact it has on NMSU students is by collecting statistics on use, which has been incorporated into operational policies, but another way is to survey users on their use of specific technologies to determine how the lab should be improved and which technologies they find the most useful.
- ***Implementing LibInsight.***
LibInsight, a program offered as part of the Springshare suite of tools, allows subscribers to create and share dashboards with members of the university community. These dashboards illustrate the datasets uploaded into the dashboards, showing everything from number of reference transactions per month to individual consultations by semester to breakdowns of instruction requests. This powerful analytics tool demystifies the library's work, helping show how RRS team members make an impact on student learning and research in numbers that stakeholders can use in additional reporting throughout the institution.

- ***Hiring a new Institutional Research librarian.***
While many academic libraries have librarians dedicated to advancing Open Access (OA), rather than finding a replacement for the librarian previously in that position, the search committee revised the position significantly to address changes to the field of OA, publishing, research, and the library's goal of implementing an Institutional Repository (IR) for campus publications. The new position, Institutional Research librarian, will help support all these initiatives, focusing initially on the creation of the IR and its promotion on campus. Members of RRS are involved in recruiting and interviewing candidates for the position and then helping the new librarian acclimate to the role.
- Expanding role of the Online Learning librarian. As NMSU's Global Campus continues to grow, RRS, in partnership with Global, created a librarian position designed to address NMSU Global Campus students' and faculty members' needs. As the Global Campus grows and students learn about the Online Librarian's role, the position will change, providing support, instruction, and resource advocacy to members of the Global community, and anticipating new opportunities for partnerships that benefit student outcomes.

LIBRARY SYSTEMS

Department Overview

The Systems department serves as the Information Technology department of New Mexico State University Library. It provides hardware and digital systems support for the library and serves as the primary technologist team for the institution. From coding and web development, to data manipulation, hardware support, platform support, technology consultation, and solution engineering, the Systems department provides full spectrum digital technology support for our academic library.

Accomplishments

This year marked the culmination of several keystone improvement projects for the NMSU Library digital infrastructure. The legacy library web servers libezp and libcgi were retired, despite the need to unravel significant complications before that process could be concluded. The results, however, have been dramatic. The campus Information Security unit has noted a precipitous drop in library security problems and alerts on the network. Multiple file transfer operations have been moved to vendor resources or to the NAS, making them more manageable and finally providing them with adequate documentation for departmental succession operations. Several departmental storage folders, including the vital storage for our Library's highly effective InterLibrary Loan operations, have been moved to the NAS, improving uptime, data security, and transfer speeds. A web of problematic, undocumented web address forwarding across both web servers has been dismantled. Some databases from libcgi, such as the Zuhl Collection, have already been migrated to other platforms, while significant work has been carried out by the Metadata Unit and Archives and Special Collections on others with the help of data extractions and some data transforms performed by Systems. A large amount of equipment has been retired, meaning the library does not have the expense of replacing it or continuing to maintain it.

The public computers in Zuhl and Branson, which had long been slow and problematic, were replaced with faster, more capable devices with larger monitors and new, clean peripherals. The largely unused computer equipped study carrels around the periphery of the Zuhl Library had their computers removed by central IT student technology and the carrels were upgraded with monitors, power towers and docks as a pilot project to better support patrons bringing in their own computing devices. Large displays were replaced in the group study areas of Zuhl library. The new Visiplex speaker system was expanded with additional units in new areas. Microform hardware was upgraded in the Special Collections Reading Room, providing a more powerful and more up to date unit for the use of legacy microform resources by patrons and researchers. Meanwhile the main accessibility remediation project may have reached completion, but web accessibility initiatives continue as part of our organizational commitment to recognize, support and value all of our patrons. Regular accessibility remediation and maintenance continued throughout the past year as new issues were created or come to light. Work with our friends in Reference and Research Services and Archives and Special Collections on Libguides and blog posts accessibility has also continued apace. All of this work supports our patrons and is calibrated to improve their library experience and perceptions.

Systems also embarked on work to improve working conditions for our library colleagues. Noting dissatisfaction with the smaller monitors supplied at library workstations, the department determined that one of the best ways to reduce eye strain and the general working environment in the short term would be to upgrade workstations to a larger monitor size. As part of this effort a large number of monitors were replaced during a general replacement project across both libraries. Numerous computers were also upgraded and replaced, in some cases as part of effort to ameliorate persistent problems by users who had been previously under-resourced and in other cases to proactively prevent issues that were on the horizon (such as the impending retirement of intel-based mac hardware). Systems continued to pursue reports of remaining Windows 10 devices, upgrading them when possible and replacing them when it was not. In support of a patron request and the internal need to preserve some legacy media Systems integrated several pieces of hardware and software to build a device capable of reading obsolete 5.5" floppy disks. This machine was used to successfully remove data from a number of disks from the Archives collection so that their data could be appropriately curated. In a move to significantly upgrade printing resources a major project was completed to replace most of the library's large network printers with newer models. These efforts represent deliberate moves to support our library colleagues in pursuit of the Library's mission.

In a new strategy for the current Systems team a student employee was brought on board to assist with disposal and the department's incipient inventory. Mia Herrera soon became an important part of the team who did excellent work in cataloging and facilitating disposal operations for Systems and who laid the groundwork for an inventory of Systems holdings.

Modern organizations do not thrive in the absence of quality analytics and Systems has had a major role in improving the Library's analytics posture over the past year. Reference and Research Services took the lead in adopting the new LibInsight platform and Systems, along with creating its own dashboard, supported the effort by building a page to display departmental dashboards in a tabbed format on the library website. When Access Services discovered that the tattle tape gates had begun to fail, Systems worked with them and administration in selecting and deploying new people counters. This required working with facilities to have power over ethernet connections installed and deployed prior to the installation of the devices. The new counters, which use overhead infrared-enabled cameras and machine learning software, are already providing a radically improved level of accuracy over the older, horizontal electric eye technology previously in use. Such counters could not parse out groups moving through the electric eye beam and could be impacted by ambient light conditions. New counts are showing how significant past undercounting was, allowing us to better represent library value through physical usage.

LOOKING FORWARD

The Systems department has been following a challenging but clear development arc designed to move it further away from crisis operations, a response-driven posture, a “keeping the wheels on the bus” approach to increasingly decaying digital infrastructure, and a process-impoverished environment. This arc has moved Systems in the direction of a more proactive posture characterized by more and tighter process, a transition to more supportable and maintainable infrastructure models, an increase in planning and deliberation, and a growing level of consideration for the maintainability of new approaches and strategies. This change has led to the introduction of new levels and types of documentation and planning/process mechanisms that emphasize successful succession operations for positions and projects in the department as the organization moves forward.

By making the progress we have this year we will now be able to focus more energy on “normalizing” operations from an IT shop perspective. This includes continued moves on infrastructure items that are still not optimal (moving Time Limit Manager to a cloud-based version as that becomes available, as one example), but more importantly it means doing more work to establish defined maintenance windows to help avoid problems before they appear. It means continuing efforts to expand intune adoption, expanding our departmental inventory until it is completed, and expanding planning and internal collaboration efforts in our challenging campus technology environment. We have begun collaborative projects that will redesign parts of the library website, expand Primo search, and improve other parts of our users’ experiences. We will begin working to shift our security focus to desktops and other networked devices in our continued efforts to keep our University and Library systems safe. And we will work to continue to provide high quality technology support to our colleagues and users while continually striving to husband our library budget dollars responsibly, serving the taxpayers of our great state in a way we can all be proud of.

Library System by the numbers:

From July 1, 2024 to July 1, 2025 Systems resolved 426 tickets. For that same period the library website had over 54,000 active users, of whom 50,000 were new users. 40,483 of those users visited our site from a desktop computer. The rest of them used mobile devices, with the exception of two users who accessed our website from smart tvs. Altogether this amounted to 142,412 separate sessions of user activity. The library homepage was viewed 127,868 times.

Major Accomplishments

- **Acquisitions**
 - After less than a year of using the Ex Libris Rialto acquisitions platform, the vendor changed the parameters with regard to ordering single, title-by-title e-books
 - Updated lost/missing items
 - Cleaned up 'in transit' items
 - Cleaned up items assigned to B-label
 - Began working on closing open purchase orders with over 315 closed as of June 30. There are approximately 3,700 remaining
 - Assisted Collections with assessment projects
- **Cataloging**
 - The Government Printing Office ceased printing government documents. As a result, MARCive discontinued record provision services. To address this issue, we turned on the federal documents community zone in Alma, however this is not a comprehensive collection of federal documents. As a result of these two items, users will only be able to find a limited number of documents through Primo and will have to rely on basic Internet searching to find items
 - Worked with Access Services to develop a procedure for noting in Primo which items are on the display shelves
 - Worked with Archives and Special Collections to develop procedures for re-labeling/ALMA update of Special Collections oversized materials and preliminary draft of adding comic books to collections
 - Created new procedure 'Cataloging Special Collections Materials II' on cataloging/processing Special Collections audio/visual materials and materials housed in pamphlet binders to ensure uniform approach taken among Cataloging Unit staff members
 - Trained Library Specialist on copy cataloging audio-visual materials and state government documents
 - Created new procedure 'State government documents from the New Mexico State Library' on cataloging/processing state government documents to ensure uniform approach taken among Cataloging Unit staff members
 - Worked with Archives and Special Collections to develop procedures for re-labeling/ALMA update of Special Collections oversized materials and preliminary draft of adding comic books to collections
- **Metadata**
 - Completed on schedule three-year long digitization project funded by the National Endowment for the Humanities in 2022. Over the duration of the project, we processed 6,937 pieces of the Amador family correspondence with bilingual metadata and made this digital collection available on our new discovery platform Open Access (OA) by LibNova

- Set up a new digital collection on the OA discovery platform, The Round-Up, 1893-1999, and to date uploaded 513 issues of this popular student newspaper online. This project has been critical since the server hosting the newspaper collection previously was terminated by July 1, 2025
- Set up another collection in OA, Hobson-Huntsinger Photograph Collection, 1890-1982, and tested some options for displaying records online
- Assisted by the Library Systems staff customized and fine-tuned the OA discovery platform

 - Complete re-labeling and update Alma/Primo for Special Collections oversized collection
- *Acquisitions*

 - Complete study of consortium pricing for current subscribed products
 - Address backlog in physical processing due to lack of students for 6 weeks
 - Various usage studies of online and physical products.
 - Work on additional assessment projects
 - Review unit needs and organization when ERMS Librarian starts
- *Metadata*
 - Move all collections off of ContentDm
 - Complete migration of The Round-Up to Open Access Platform
 - Begin working on migration of the Hobson-Huntsinger collection to Open Access Platform
 - Update Digital Collections LibGuide landing page

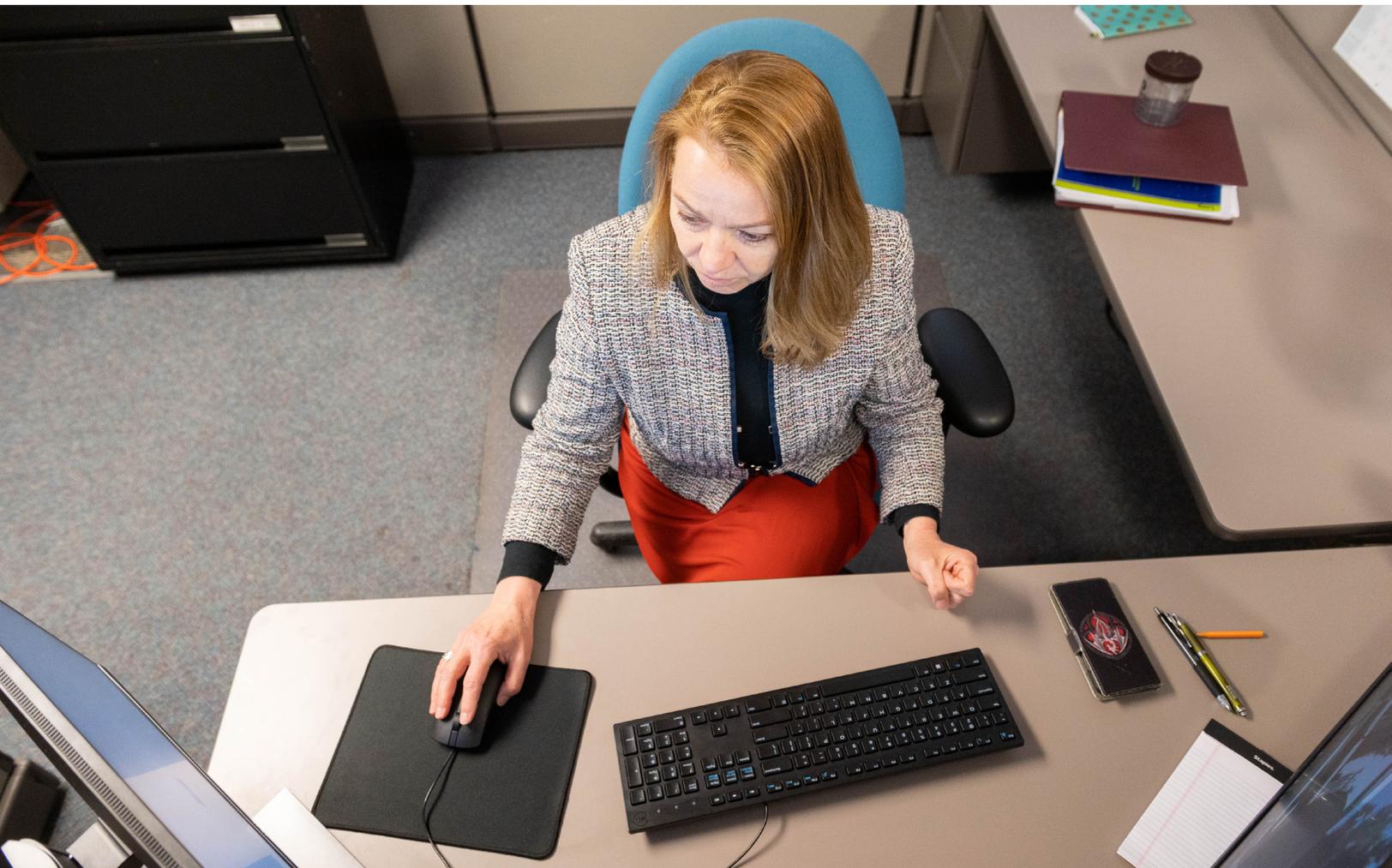
